To our St. Francis Xavier Parish family:
First, thank you all for your patience and prayers as we work through how to safely open our parish for public Masses again. To date we can still only have 10 people at any one Mass (we are hoping and praying that this will change soon). We will **try** to resume public Masses June 13 & 14. As we move forward, we need to introduce the sign up system and review detailed safety measures. This information will be shared on the website, Facebook, group email and a mailed letter.

We would also like to remind everyone that we are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass until further notice. If you are uncomfortable with attending any group gathering, or have a preexisting medical condition that would make you more susceptible; or are ill or have any symptoms of covid19; please stay home and take care of yourself. You will still be able to view weekend Mass on our Facebook page or through the link on our website under events.

Please sign up for Mass by 5pm Thursday as we need a record of who will be attending what Mass. If someone has not signed up or called in they will not be allowed to attend that Mass. Due to the current limited spaces, please sign up for only 1 weekend Mass and allow others the opportunity to attend Mass the following weekend. Also, we are hoping to schedule weekday Masses soon.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity Sunday

Scripture Readings

Exodus 34:4B-6, 8-9

Deuteronomy 3:52-56

2 Corinthians 13:11-13

John 3:16-18

A Family Perspective by Bud Ozar – As the Father “sent his son into the world” so parents send their children into the world “so that the world might be saved.” This is the missionary role of the Christian family. Your family is a school where your children develop convictions which enable them to make a difference in the world.

Question of the Week- *A God of Love*

For Adults: We live within the Trinity whenever we live in love. How does this mystery connect to your daily life?

For Children: How do you choose to live as a more loving person?

SAFETY MEASURES

1. Sign up is required to keep the number at 50 and to collect contact information in case someone in attendance has/or comes down with Covid19.
2. Proper social distancing - There will be people at each Mass for helping insure proper social distancing.
3. Hand sanitization - There are automatic hand sanitizers as you enter. Also, feel free to bring your own hand sanitizer from home.
4. Mask wearing is necessary for ALL over the age of 2 years.
5. When you receive Communion, you will be directed to maintain social distancing. Keep your mask on until you are ready to receive Communion.
6. There will be one entrance (the parking lot door) and one exit (the front door of the Church).
7. There is to be no social gathering before or after Mass in the Church, Church parking lot on any Church property.
8. There will be signs posted to help people.
9. There will be no passing of the collection basket; I ask that you place your contribution in the basket provided (we are in the process of getting permanent fixtures for this); also you may still drop off your donation through the mail slot in the Rectory or send it by mail or use the electronic/bank means some of you already have.

Most Holy Trinity Sunday

“The Feast of the Most Holy Trinity leads us to contemplate the mystery of God who unceasingly creates, redeems and sanctifies, always with love and through love.”

—Pope Francis, May 27, 2018

The **mystery of the Holy Trinity** is the central mystery of the Christian faith and life. God reveals himself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The doctrine of the Trinity includes three truths of faith.

First, the Trinity is One. We do not speak of three gods but of one God. Each of the Persons is fully God. They are a unity of Persons in one divine nature.

Second, the Divine Persons are distinct from each other. Father, Son, and Spirit are not three appearances or modes of God, but three identifiable persons, each fully God in a way distinct from the others.

Third, the Divine Persons are in relation to each other. The distinction of each is understood only in reference

to the others. The Father cannot be the Father without the Son, nor can the Son be the Son without the Father. The Holy Spirit is related to the Father and the Son who both send him forth.

All Christians are baptized in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The Trinity illumines all the other mysteries of faith.

Saint of the Week

Saint Ephrem, Deacon and Doctor of the Church

c. 306–373 | FEAST DAY JUNE 9

Known to Syrian Christians as “the harp of the Holy Ghost,” this Mesopotamian from Nisibia was baptized at 18 and may have accompanied his bishop to the Council of Nicaea in 325. He served as head of the cathedral school and left Nisibia only after it became Persian. In 363 he moved to a cave overlooking Edessa but preached frequently in the city and wrote many poems, hymns and biblical commentaries; he organized a choir of women to sing his hymns during liturgies. About 370 he visited St. Basil in Caesarea. The winter before his death, he earned praise for managing relief supplies during a severe famine in Edessa. Ephraem is the only Syrian father declared a doctor of the church.
